SAT/ACT Test-Taking Strategies!







Although a relatively straightforward process, applying for admission to colleges and universities seems like a complex rite of passage that causes anxiety for many students. Here are a few tips and tricks that will help with the standardized tests that are part of the process!



• Before the Test, Part I: Create Your Game Plan

- Even if you have a good GPA, you still need to prepare to take standardized tests like the SAT and ACT. College admissions offices will take your GPA and your standardized test scores into consideration as they decide whether you will be admitted to their school. In fact, they are among the most important aspects of your application. Accordingly, you will need apply the same level of focus that has allowed you to achieve a good GPA to achieve a competitive score on the SAT and/or ACT.
- Start studying for standardized tests no less than two months prior to the
 test date. You will need to set aside time each day during that period for
 test preparation. If you put in the time every day, you will have given
 yourself plenty of opportunities to take practice tests, etc. Most
 importantly, you will avoid the least effective study method, which is
 cramming.
- Use the SAT and ACT official test websites to develop study methods.
 While both the SAT and ACT are accepted by many colleges and universities, there are differences between the tests. Accordingly, the official test websites for each will provide you with a variety of study tools that are tailored to their respective tests. In addition, you should consult other sites like Khan Academy (khanacademy.org) for free practice tests.



TIPStricks

- Before the Test, Part II: Take Practice Tests
 - When practicing for standardized tests, do not flip back and forth after each question to the answer section; complete a section or a page before checking your answers.
 - There is only one correct answer; eliminate incorrect answers to get to the correct answer.
 - Complete easier questions first, then return to the more difficult questions or questions you marked.






- Taking the Test: Set Yourself Up for Success
 - Don't cram the night before! Get a good night's sleep before and eat a good breakfast on the day of the test.
 - If you are unsure of an answer, then guess! There is no penalty for guessing on the SAT or ACT.
 - Budget your time, read each question carefully, and don't change your answers unless you're absolutely sure you've made a mistake.

You have studied hard over the last few months, and the test is just around the corner. Set yourself up for success with this Test Day checklist:

- ✓ If you are not familiar with the test site, visit it in advance. That will give you one less thing to worry about on the day of the test.
- ✓ Do not cram the night before! If you have studied in advance, trust in your preparation.
- ✓ Get a good night's sleep before and set an alarm that you will be sure to wake up with plenty of time to arrive early to the test site.
- ✓ Dress in comfortable clothes and in layers so that you can make adjustments quickly based upon the temperature in the test room.
- ✓ Eat a good breakfast on the day of the test and bring healthy snacks and water to replenish your energy during breaks.
- ✓ Budget your time, read each question carefully, and do not change your answers unless you are absolutely sure you have made a mistake.
- ✓ If you are unsure of an answer, guess! There is no penalty for guessing on the SAT or ACT.

✓ If get distracted or frustrated, take a moment to close your eyes, take a few deep breaths, and proceed once you feel calmer. You can do this!
